

The story of a life and a philosophy A portrait of Toshihiko Izutsu






"Sharqī" is the world's first bio-pic about the philosopher Toshihiko Izutsu (1914-1993). His linguistic theology and comparative philosophy, which he wrote in English, are wellknown outside of Japan. However, his long-cherished concept of "Oriental philosophy" was never known outside of Japan and has been forgotten even within the country. On the other hand, Izutsu spent a long time working in Iran, deeply influencing modern and contemporary Iranian thought. This film, directed by Iranian filmmaker Masoud Taheri, features interviews with Izutsu's friends, colleagues, students, and researchers, offering a groundbreaking view of the scholar that includes valuable testimonials and new materials. It vividly portrays the journey of the great philosopher and his lesser-known aspects.



Renowned Japanese Islamic scholar and philosopher Toshihiko Izutsu was born on May 4, 1914, in Tokyo. During his childhood, he was compelled to practice Zazen (Zen meditation) and study the scriptures of the Sōtō Zen school due to his father's deep interest in it. However, Izutsu did not appreciate this experience

and distanced himself from Zen and Buddhist thought, eventually shifting his focus to linguistics. As a result, he went on to learn 30 different languages, which became the solid foundation for constructing and compiling his philosophical system.

In 1934, Izutsu enrolled in the Faculty of Letters at Keiō

University, where he was captivated by lectures given by Orikuchi Shinobu (1887-1953) and received guidance from his professor, Junzaburō Nishiwaki (1894-1982). While studying various languages, he developed an interest in Arabic and deepened his knowledge of Arabic and Islamic thought through encounters with two Tatar individuals, Abdürreşid İbrahim (1857-1944) and Mūsā Jārullāh (1870/75-1949). Izutsu's expertise in this field eventually led him to translate the Qur'an into Japanese between 1951 and 1958. This translation, published in three volumes by Iwanami Shoten in 1957-58, was the first direct translation from Arabic to Japanese and is recognized as the fourth Japanese translation of the Qur'an.

In 1959, Izutsu received a scholarship from the Rockefeller Foundation and traveled to the Middle East and Europe for two years. Towards the end of his scholarship period, he received an invitation from McGill University's "Institute of Islamic Studies" and stayed in Canada for a while.

While in Canada, Izutsu taught Islamic classical literature and published three significant and relatively new works on Qur'anic semantics (Qur'an semantics) and Islamic theology, earning him international acclaim and revered status in his field.

Additionally, during his time in Canada, Izutsu developed close relationships with Iranian scholar





Mehdi Mohaghegh (1930-) and Swiss scholar Hermann Landolt (1935-). Through Landolt's introduction, Izutsu became involved with the Eranos Conference and, in collaboration with Mohaghegh, established the "McGill University Institute of Islamic Studies - Tehran Branch." Izutsu stayed in Iran for approximately ten years, teaching and conducting research not only at the aforementioned institute but also at the "Imperial Iranian Academy of

Philosophy" and the "Iranian Center for the Study of Cultures."

After the Iranian Revolution in 1979, Izutsu returned to Japan and made efforts to conceptualize the results of his long-standing activities and research as the structural framework of "Oriental philosophy." He analyzed philosophical systems from Eastern traditions such as Vedānta, Taoism, Buddhism, Confucianism, Islamic Mysticism, Qabbālā, Neoand Platonism, aiming to identify

structural unity among these philosophies. Izutsu referred to his own philosophical system as "Oriental philosophy.

After years of research on Islam and "Oriental philosophy," Toshihiko Izutsu passed away on January 7, 1993. His grave is located in Unchōan, one of the sub-temples of Engaku-ji in Kita-Kamakura area.


